THE SUFFERING SERVANT - by Chris

Condolences

Our condolences to Abbie and John Froese family, on the recent passing of Abbie's mom. May you sense God's comfort and strength during this time.

He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of sorrows, and familiar with pain... Surely He took up our pain and bore our suffering...He was pierced for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon Him, and by His wounds we are healed. We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; but the LORD has laid upon Him the iniquity of us all. (Isa 53:3-6)

He's alive. He's dead. He's alive again! (and you thought you had an exciting weekend...)

This was the text of a print ad that we put together many years ago at the first church I worked at. We put it in local newspapers the week before Easter, wishing the community a Happy Easter weekend and inviting anyone who wanted to join us for our Good Friday and Easter Sunday services. It still makes me chuckle...it's pretty good! And in a short, pithy way, it highlights what would be safe to say was likely the most dramatic weekend in the history of the world.

We are about half-way through Lent, and Easter will be upon us in a few weeks. For Christ-followers, this brings a two-fold focus: the resurrection of Jesus, and His triumph over sin and death which has brought us back to God and to eternal life; but also the passion of Jesus, His anguish, as He sacrificed and suffered and died horrifically on the cross for our sake. We celebrate and rejoice in the first; we grieve and lament the second. It's an emotional weekend, to be certain!

Isaiah penned the Scriptures above around 700 years before Jesus would walk the earth. As a prophet, the Holy Spirit revealed to him what was to come, and one of the things that he saw, which must have seemed shocking at the time, was that the saving Messiah who was to come would not necessarily look the way that the stereotype might have suggested. Rather than the strong, conquering, adored, in-your-face leader that Israel was expecting, this Messiah would in fact be a humble man, a rejected man, a suffering man, a man of sorrows. His life would not be easy. He would not be accepted. Signs are pointing to violence committed against Him, and the prophet speaks of a "crushing" that would come upon Him.

And all of this, unfairly. He is not suffering for His own sins and errors. Rather, He took up *our* pain, bore *our* suffering, was crushed for *our* iniquities, took the punishment that brought *us* peace, by His wounds we are healed, and though we have gone astray like sheep, God has laid upon *Him* the sin of *us* all.

Jesus is the Suffering Servant of God. In one of the most staggering and mindblowing facets of this great Christ-story, God actually came down and suffered through life *with* us. He felt pain *with* us. He was rejected *with* us. His heart broke *with* us. He felt injustice *with* us. And He experienced death *with* us. God-with-us went through life on this broken, sinful planet, and lived as we live and felt what we feel and suffered as we suffer. We serve a God with scars.

Yet that is not the end of the story, of course. The weekend needs to yet unfold. Friday is full of suffering, Saturday is full of disappointment, but Sunday is coming! And Sunday is different – Sunday is full of life, life that beats death, life that cannot be conquered, life that lasts forever! It is a weekend like no other – that weekend where God entered fully into our suffering and our death, and by entering into it, defeated and overcame it forever. Suffering loses, and life wins, and wins for good.
